College Promise programs support college access and completion, create a "college-going culture" in the communities where they exist, and strengthen the local economy. California has emerged as a leader in the development and implementation of College Promise programs, with nearly 55 programs in existence or

announced by the state's community colleges.

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Key challenges that Promise programs in California are facing include ensuring financial sustainability and strengthening partnerships across education segments and community sectors. The second annual College Promise conference will respond to these challenges by highlighting innovative funding strategies and insights into developing and sustaining cross-sector collaboration around College Promise.
